ABOUT THE UKULELE

(from Your World Encyclopedia*)



The earliest beginnings of the instrument that would come to be known as the ukulele can be attributed to Joao Fernandes, who arrived in Honolulu on August 23, 1879 aboard the *Ravenscrag*. Thankful for a safe journey, Fernandes leaped off the ship and began playing his braguinha, a small guitar-like instrument. The braguinha was an immediate hit with the Hawaiians who heard its sharp tones.

The Portugese braguinha was adapted into something more like the ukulele we know by Manuel Nunez, another passenger on the *Ravenscrag*. The body was made larger and the steel strings were replaced with catgut then tuned differently. The native Hawaiian wood used to make these new instruments gave a unique sound to their playing. The wood of the koa tree was light and gave a strong resonance to the small instrument.

This new instrument was given the name "ukulele" (Hawaiian for "jumping flea") either after the way a performer's fingers jumped quickly around the fingerboard or after the skinny English performer Edward Purvis, who himself earned the nickname "Jumping Flea" due to his habit of jumping around the stage while playing his still unnamed braguinha-like instrument.



The ukulele's first formal introduction to North America came in 1915 when Hawaii opened its pavillion at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition. The ukulele had the same effect on the spectators at the Exposition as the braguinha had on the passersby at that Honolulu harbor some 150 years before. The ukulele charmed audiences and won a place in the popular music of the day.




The ukulele enjoyed a resurgence in popularity in the 1950s when the South Pacific craze swept North America. When television personality Arthur Godfrey played and endorsed ukuleles on his program, sales of the little Hawaiian instrument went through the roof.


Though often regarded as a novelty instrument, the ukulele remains one of the most popular instruments in the world. Modern performers have included the ukulele in rock and roll, jazz, and classical pieces.

All this talk about ukuleles, and we haven't even been introduced to one. The drawings below name all the parts of a ukulele for you. We will refer to these various parts as we learn how to play, so this would be a good time to get your terminology straight.



Lesson 1 – C chord



Chord #1: C

The C chord is one of the easiest and most useful chords. In fact, you can play two songs right now using only the C chord! To form a C chord, place your ring finger on the A string, right behind the third fret. Now strum all four strings. They should all sound clear.
